PRELUDE FOR ORGAN

La Nativité du Seigneur: iii. Desseins éternels

Olivier Messiaen (1908-1992)

In 1935, Messiaen, who served as organist of the Church of the Holy Trinity (9th arrondissement) in Paris, composed a set of nine meditations on the birth of the Savior. This movement, translated as "Eternal Purposes," has Ephesians 1:5-6 printed at the top of the score: "[God] destined us for adoption as his children through Jesus Christ, according to the good pleasure of his will, to the praise of his glorious grace that he freely bestowed on us in the Beloved."

The melody moves slowly atop dense chords, all part of Messiaen's own tonal system, his "modes of limited transposition."

SERMON "First Things First" Rev. Love

***AFFIRMATION OF FAITH** (The Nicene Creed)

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen. We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father; through him all things were made. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is worshiped and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

Through Christ, with Christ, in Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all glory belongs to you, O God, full of grace and truth. **Amen.**



Jesus is described as the "true light" - the light of all people. Connect the dots to form a candle. Around the candle, write or draw some ways you see God's light in the world.






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WORSHIP · BULLETIN
