Change is Gonna Come



About a decade ago, a fast-moving storm came through Rye one afternoon. One of the high winds' casualties was the "Christmas Tree" on the front lawn. It is a much beloved Atlas cedar, and as it is lit each year on the first weekend of December, for countless years it has been the gathering place of the congregation when we begin the journey from Advent to Christmas. And with that storm, suddenly the Tree Lighting tradition was in doubt because the top of the tree lay on the front lawn amid a tangle of lights. Had the weather Grinch stolen Christmas?

Thanks to our tree company and electrician, Christmas came after all. The cedar was trimmed and saved (though it looks more like a very large Christmas bush than a tree), and the lights were fixed. It wasn't the same, but it was ready to be a harbinger of Christmas once more.

But discouraging warnings were spoken. The tree has seen better days. The lights are getting more challenging to keep running reliably. So to hedge our bets, a new tree was planted nearby through the generosity of one of our Confirmation Class gifts. For the days are surely coming, say our experts, when the old tree will need to be removed, and a new Advent tradition will need to begin.

I can hear the laptops starting up and emails being written even now. The tree is gone?! No!!! We've <u>always</u> started the Christmas season there at that tree with carols and candlelight and wax dripping on our mittens!

Don't worry... yet. It is still there, and again this year we will gather there on December 4 at 7 PM. We will light our candles, and we will sing our carols. Christmas will come. But one year, that tree will be no longer, and a new tree – yes, a smaller tree still finding its roots – will be the focal point of the congregation. grow into our God-given purpose. And we do so with traditions that we hold with the tightest of grips.

For now, we will sing in the season with two trees. But the day for change will come. For some of you this year, change has already come to your Christmas traditions, brought on by a change in your life or the loss of a loved one. Peace and good cheer may not come easily in the wake of such events. For you, our Longest Night service on December 21 – a quiet time of reflection on the darkest day of the year – may be a meaningful new tradition. Or while we are mixing things up, how about coming to church on Christmas morning? Yes, Christmas Day is a Sunday, and yes, there will be worship at 10 AM. A once-in-a-decade event!



Please take a look through this edition of Grace Notes. You'll find familiar traditions and a few new twists. And then come! Come all ye faithful and all ye who are still working on it. Join together in ways old and new, as we prepare Him room in our hearts and lives.



The Offering distributes gifts equally to the Assistance Program of the Board of Pensions and to Presbyterian-related schools and colleges equipping communities of color. The Assistance Program provides critical financial support to church workers and their families. Presbyterian-related schools and colleges provide education and leadership development while nurturing racial and ethnic heritage.

By supporting the Assistance Program of the Board of Pensions (BOP), the Christmas Joy Offering honors the faithfulness of current and retired church workers and their families in need. Thanks in part to support from this Offering, church workers can receive critical financial assistance to support them through life's challenging circumstances. These generous actions bear witness to our faithful response to God's charge to love one another as Christ commanded.

- \$1.1 million of gifts from 2021 are being used to provide critical financial support and grants for current and retired Presbyterian church workers in their times of need.
- Income supplements from the BOP helped 278 individual recipients, assisting retired church workers, and surviving spouses with the means to provide for themselves.

- Housing supplements from the BOP helped more than 227 individual recipients remain in their homes, afford assisted living, or long-term care.
- Emergency Assistance Grants from the BOP helped more than 246 individual recipients facing times of great financial need or uncertainty due to unforeseen circumstances.

While we are blessed to experience first-hand the many gifts that John, Dan and Jean-Paul give to our church through worship, education and pastoral care, our congregation may not be aware of the myriad of contributions that these three pastors serve to our greater Presbyterian community.



In addition to his steadfast dedication to his pastoral responsibilities at RPC, Reverend Dan Love continues to take an active role in the care and maintenance of our beautiful sanctuary and grounds. We are grateful for his work to bring us the beautiful new Sarah and Abraham stained glass window. Likewise, we are thankful for Dan's efforts to move our service to a virtual platform during the beginning of the pandemic so that we could stay connected to one another and to our church on Sunday mornings. Dan is also an integral part of our youth's journey of faith, guiding high school freshmen along the confirmation process and supporting them as they develop their own statements of faith and prepare to become members of our church. Additionally, Dan joins a group of eager high school students on a mission trip to New Orleans each summer, and he recently led a group of curious church members on pilgrimage to the Holy Land. Sharing his gifts beyond our RPC com-

munity, Dan is serving on the City of Rye Police Advisory Committee. In December, Dan will have completed 6 years on the Hudson River Committee on Ministry, serving as liaison to several churches in the presbytery and the head of the Presbytery Credentials team. Dan is celebrating his 25th year as one of our pastors this year. We thank you, Dan!



Reverend Dr. John Miller brings to us his gift of curiosity and thinking outside the box. His creativity has led to positive changes in the life of our church over the past 10 years, such as worship under the tent each September. John oversees multiple programs for RPC, including Coming Home, an 18-week program which pairs RPC congregants with the formerly incarcerated to help them transition back to their communities. He has recently committed countless hours to learning about suicide awareness and prevention, and he, along with Jean-Paul, has brought this knowledge to our members through the *Soul Shop* workshops. It was John's vision and passion for our greater community that brought us on the journey to acquire the All Souls property for it to become the All Souls Community Center. John spearheaded the long process and continues to take a leadership role in overseeing the implementation of new community outreach program possibilities at the Port Chester campus, Extending beyond RPC, John is involved with the Rising Hope, Inc. program, a college level

educational program for the inmates at Sing Sing where he has been teaching an "Introduction of Counseling" course in that program since the fall of 2014. Reverend Dr. John Miller celebrates 40 years of ordination to the ministry of word and sacrament this year and will celebrate his 10th year as a co-pastor in 2023. We thank you, John!



In addition to expanding the amazing scope of programming for the youth of RPC, Reverend Jean-Paul Marshall actively oversees all Sunday School programming. He is continually seeking ways to create fellowship among our youth whether it be through Saturday morning donuts, leading the yearly service trip to New Orleans, engaging the youth in local service projects, challenging the youth to a game of giant Jenga, or introducing them to a calming time for reflection through Vespers. He has also received over 30 hours of training on mental health and suicide awareness and, alongside John, has shared his knowledge with fellow parishioners during the recent *Soul Shop* workshops. In helping to serve the greater community, this year JP assisted the congregation of Bryn Mawr Park Presbyterian Church with closing their doors, addressing financial issues, helping tenants find alternative meeting spaces, and is currently working on completing the sale of the proper-

ty on the presbytery's behalf. He is also going into his third year as co-chair of the Hudson River Committee on Preparation for Ministry, which nurtures and guides those discerning ordination. Reverend J.P. Marshall will celebrate his 5th year as RPC's associate pastor in 2023. We thank you, Jean-Paul!

Dan, John and Jean-Paul have dedicated a collective 40 years of their time and their hearts to our RPC community and beyond. To honor Dan's 25th, John's 10th and Jean-Paul's 5th anniversaries, and to express our deep gratitude for their service, we are planning a well-earned celebration of our wonderful pastors this spring! Help RPC Relaunch COMING HOME

Our Imagine Initiative several years ago helped us launch our Coming Home program. We celebrated our graduates for the first four years. Then, in 2020, the pandemic caused us to suspend the program, which was not held in 2021 or this year.

We are planning to relaunch the program in 2023. If you



aren't familiar with COMING HOME, it is an extension of our long-standing Prison Ministry at Rye Presbyterian Church. The program seeks to empower those who are returning to the community from incarceration. The 18-week program pairs RPC congregants with the formerly incarcerated to help them transition back into the community. Teaching sessions and a shared meal are on Thursday evenings. In 2023 we hope to begin on February 2 and conclude with graduation on Sunday, June 4.

This ministry offers several volunteer opportunities, including serving as mentors, who are paired with participants, supporting and encouraging them during the course of the program; as well as cooks who prepare and serve a



meal enjoyed by the participants and RPC congregants who share table fellowship together. In order to relaunch Coming Home, we need a committed group of volunteers who will once again serve to make Rye Presbyterian Church a place of welcome to those who are returning home from prison. 
