Once again we've decked the halls of the Miller manse for Advent and Christmas. Included in our Christmas decorations is a collection of crèches. Each time I unwrap them I am reminded of the poem entitled "Christmas Eve" (based on Luke 2:1-14) written by one of my seminary

mentors, David Steele. I want to share it with you here, along with a prayer from the Church of Scotland Common Order.

We place the precious Christmas manger Upon the mantle . . . out of danger. Hand-painted Kings from Hummel lands Are putty in young, chubby hands; And glass-blown sheep are too exquisite And fragile for a child to visit. So, while we like them very much, We ask the kids to look . . DON'T TOUCH!

But once, I saw on a low table, Mary, Joseph, star and stable, The Babe, some sheep, and several kings Heavy, sturdy, rough-hewn things. Here children dawdled—took their ease, Read the sign: "Come, touch us, please." And every child produced a fresh Arrangement of that Christmas Creche.

While donkeys watched the Baby sleep, Angels petted woolly sheep. And Mary rested from the noise As Joseph chatted with the boys. Each child knew to some degree Just how that scene was meant to be. I watched, with quite a little mirth Them orchestrate the Holy Birth. So God, for her who understands,
Entrusts His coming to our hands.
He urges us now to begin
To place ourselves, our kith and kin...
And choose, among the many choices,
Where best we'll hear those angels' voices;
And join that Hallelujah Chorus
Knowing God's at hand ... and for us.

So, friends, with bright and shiny faces, The King is coming! Take your places!





The Christmas Joy Offering



Every year during this season of Advent and Christmas, Presbyterians around the world share with others in need through our church-wide Christmas Joy offering.

This Offering supports two great missions.

The Christmas Joy Offering supports the Assistance Program of the Board of Pensions (BOP), which provides critical financial assistance to both current and retired church workers to support them through life's challenging circumstances.

In 2018, \$1.2 million of gifts were used to provide financial support and grants for current and retired Presbyterian church workers in their times of need. The BOP provided income supplements to nearly 325 households, assisting retired church workers and their surviving spouses with the means to provide for themselves. Housing supplements from the BOP helped more than 262 households remain in their homes, afford assisted living, or long-term care. Finally, Shared and Emergency Grants helped more than 291 households face times of great financial need or uncertainty due to unforeseen circumstances.

The second mission is the PC (USA), which has a very strong historical commitment to higher learning, and which promotes education and leadership development through the establishment

and support of Presbyterian-related schools and colleges equipping communities of color. Our future leaders of color can receive much needed assistance while they discover and pursue their professional goals at these schools and colleges. In 2018, \$1.0 million of gifts were used to provide education and leadership development skills at Presbyterian -related schools. Many of these students are the first in their families to enroll in higher educations. Your gifts allow these ministries to continue sustaining a tradition Presbyterians have carried out for nearly 140 years.

Caritas of Port Chester

Caritas of Port Chester, located in central Port Chester, at St. Peter's Episcopal Church, 19 Smith St, will provide approximately 190,000 meals in 2019 through their five-day-a-week Soup Kitchen and twice-

weekly Choice Pantry.

There is a small staff, but it is the volunteers that help Caritas PC accomplish its work. RPC members are invited to become part of this effort. Volunteers are needed in the Sous Chef program that preps the lunch meals and in the Choice Pantry as stockers and personal shoppers.

The Sous Chef program requires a commitment of one weekday a month from 9:15 a.m.-12:30 p.m., helping to prep and serve the meals. Volunteers for the Pantry can come either Wednesdays (8:00-9:30 a.m.) or Saturdays (7:00-9:30 a.m.). Any student 14 years or older can volunteer and earn community service. Families can volunteer, too.

David Coleman Concert, Coming Home

STANDING O FOR THREE CHORDS AND THE TRUTH



On November 17, David Coleman gave a moving and memorable concert, *Three Chords and the Truth*, for a rapt audience of about 100. At the end, David received a well-deserved standing ovation. In the concert, David was accompanied by Robert Pollock, a brilliant violinist and guitarist with whom he had been incarcerated. After each of the 12 songs that David sang while playing his guitar, he read a brief narrative from his life story. It is a harrowing story of an abusive childhood, followed by truancy in his early years, and petty crimes in his early teens, which earned him two years in a juvenile detention facility. After his release, life was no better and he resumed his criminal ways. Ultimately, he killed another person for which he was sentenced, at age 17, to 25 years to life. He was released less than three years ago.

The songs David sang, half of which he wrote, put into music pieces of the narrative of David's life. For example "Pill Poppin' Man" recounts his serious addiction to drugs (which he stopped taking, along with alcohol, about 30 years ago) or "Coffin Dancer," describes the trajectory that crime and violence were taking his life. The arc of David's life touches the bottom in "Battle of the Soul," which contains this refrain:

Do I have the strength to die the death that opens the gate the courage to gaze beyond the abyss where God awaits

Is it worth the pain pulling myself apart Rebuild the foundation Have a change of heart

After this song, the arc of the music in the concert, as well as the arc of David's life, swung back up, including a lovely song he wrote for this concert called "Before You Leave" as a reflection on re-connection with his mother. In the last solo song, after he was released, having earned a bachelor's degree, a master's de-

gree, a license in horticulture and nursery management, he discovers he has to start at the bottom again, in Jim Croce's "Car Wash Blues."

During his narrative segments, David also shed some overall light on the prison experience. Prison is a very dangerous place, where one must always be on one's guard. The Correction Officers are often more to be feared than the inmates. Yet there are some on the staff of various prisons who took pains to steer David in the right direction. He also noted that the presence of volunteers is a central element in rehabilitation. When meeting with volunteers, even for a brief couple of hours, inmates can be free to open up, experience a sense of humanity, and understand there are individuals on the outside eager to help them in the present and welcome them on release.

At the end if the concert, David invited the audience to join him in the chorus of "Soulshine":

Soulshine
It's better than sunshine
It's better than moonshine,
Damn sure better than rain
Hey now people don't mind
We all feel this way sometimes

You gotta let your soul shine, shine till the break of day.

This was a fitting end to an evening which, for all its stories of abuse, anger, crime, and prison, in the end was a testament to the power of music to enrich the human soul.



COMING HOME is Coming Back in 2020, beginning February 6

Our **COMING HOME** program seeks to empower those who are returning to the community from incarceration. This 18-week program pairs RPC congregants with

the formerly incarcerated to help them transition back to their communities. Coming Home provides life skills, goalsetting, and sharing personal stories in a safe, supportive community.

A key component of this program is the relationships that develop between mentors (volunteers from our congregation) and program participants. We are in need of those who are willing to serve as mentors. 
