Christmas is not over – together may we sing January's song!



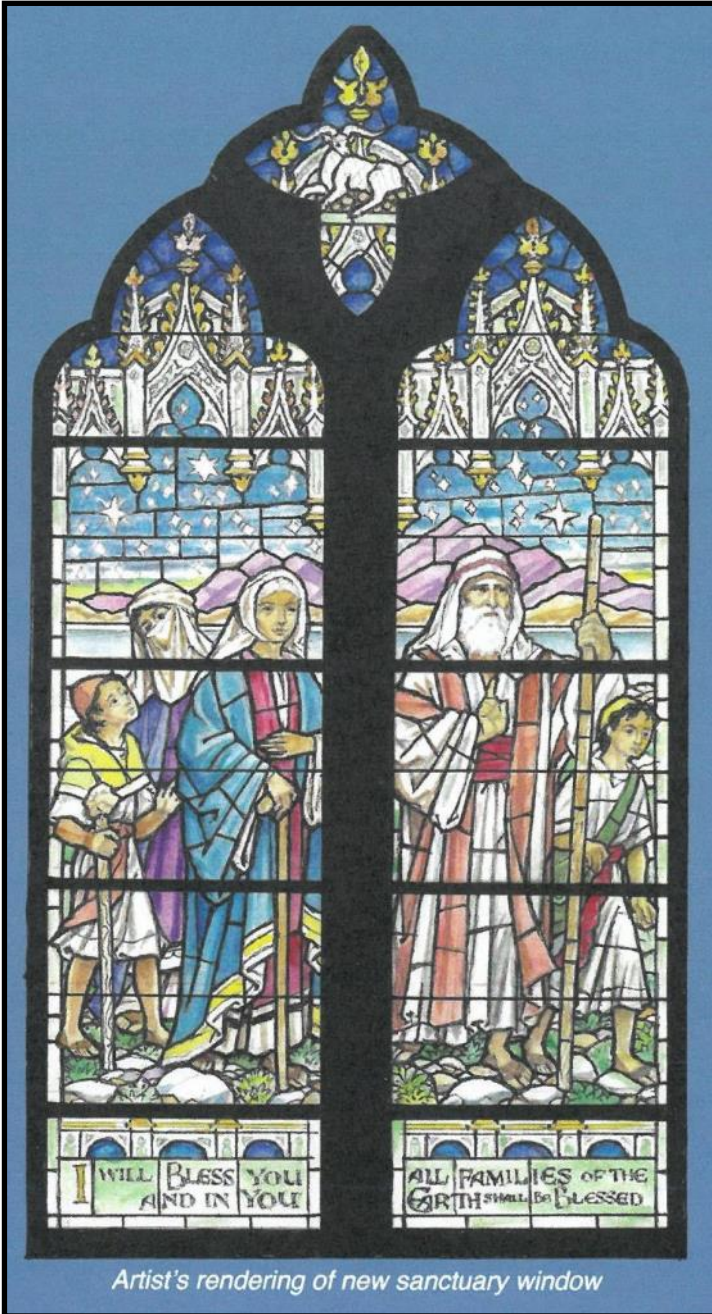

The New Abraham & Sarah Window

The New Abraham and Sarah Window Celebrating 150 years of the RPC Sanctuary



Over recent years, and especially through our now completed Imagine Initiative, we have been excellent stewards of the structure created for our inspiration by those who came before us. We have sought to faithfully repair and restore that which 150 years of use require. Decades of old paint were stripped off before fully repainting the sanctuary in 2014. New clerestory windows were installed to brighten up the space. And with the exception of the newer chancel window and the window at the front of the north aisle, all the windows in the sanctuary have been re-leaded and fully restored.

Acting on the recommendation of Rohlf's Stained Glass Studio in Mt. Vernon – the firm that has done all our window restoration – church leaders decided to replace the window at the head of the north aisle rather than restore it. It would be our gift to the sanctuary – a way of celebrating the sesquicentennial, and our way of expressing our thanks to those who invested so generously before us to create the inspiring space in which we have the joy of worshipping. It would also be our way of investing in the future so that all those who come after us might be inspired as well. Blessed by those who have come before us, we seek to be a blessing to those who will follow us.

A committee of talented church members worked hard on the plans, and after many discussions with the good people at Rohlf's, a final design was chosen: Abraham, Sarah, and their whole complicated family, stepping out in faith, and setting out on the journey to which God has called them. The artist's design, drawn in England, was pictured on this year's stewardship pledge card, and is seen here. Once that design was finalized, the fascinating work in Mt. Vernon began. Full-size drawings were done; each piece of glass hand-selected; and each piece "painted" with the many details of the drawing. After firing, all the individual glass pieces are being fit together and joined with lead. Hopefully, the window will be installed early in 2021!

At the bottom of the window is this word from Genesis: *"I will bless you, and in you all families of the earth shall be blessed."* It is the promise made by God to Abraham, and through him to each one of us who trace our spiritual lineage through him. As the people of this church have experienced in the sanctuary and in life, God promises to bless us. God promises to keep us in times of difficulty, to strengthen us in adversity, and to lead us into the future, but always with the larger world in view. Abraham and his whole complicated family were greatly blessed, and through them, all the world continues to be blessed with a rich and dynamic heritage of faith.

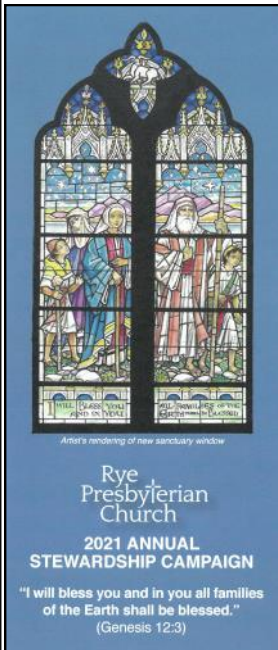

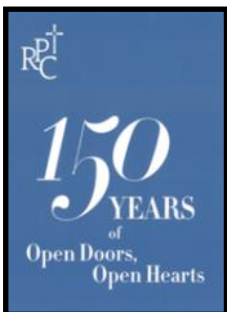
JANUARY 2021 – STEPHEN MINISTRY - RESOLVING TO LISTEN

During 2020 we learned new-fangled ways to connect with one another. Many of us found relief in outdoor explorations and video chats with friends and loved ones. However, most of us discovered seeing beyond masks and hearing beyond live-stream distractions wearisome. In *The Gifts of Imperfection*, Dr. Brené Brown defines connection as “the energy that exists between people when they feel seen, heard, and valued; when they can give and receive without judgment.”

The challenges and limitations will likely persist in 2021, however, active listening is a way we can see, hear, and communicate value to others. Tuning in to non-verbal cues and exploring the meaning behind what people say can be like a treasure hunt, while we listen through eye contact and body language (even on a computer screen). Intentional listening opens space to connect in meaningful ways.

While learning new ways to be attentive, we also have the resource of a great Comforter who, according to the Psalmist, listens intently no matter our circumstances, offering connection to our source of mercy, love, and hope. Because there is One who truly sees, hears, and values each of us, may we discover newfound energy while listening well to one another each day this year.

The Sesquicentennial Service Challenge



As we came to the close of 2020, we also came to the end of our 2020 Sesquicentennial Service Challenge! Our goal, as presented by the Mission and Outreach Committee, was to record at least 150 minutes of service from every member for every month of 2020. With 1052 members, that would have meant the total number of service minutes for 2020 would have been 1,893,600 – a lofty goal, to say the least!

As we all know, 2020 was not the year that any of us expected. As the pandemic began here in our area, we went into an extended period of time when so many of the activities of our lives were put on hold. This continues to be the case today, as we await the arrival of vaccines and hopefully the curtailing of the virus. This also challenged and changed the ways in which people could give of their time in service to others. Thus, we did not come near meeting that lofty goal, but here are some things you should know about our Service Challenge.

106 people over the 12 months faithfully recorded their service minutes. We know that our numbers were highly underreported. Nationally, 25% of Americans volunteer their time. If you take 25% of our membership number, and multiply that times the average number of minutes that were reported by these 106 people, that included some children and youth, you would end up with about 1 million minutes for the year! While that isn't near our goal, it is what was done in the midst of a raging pandemic, and that, my friends, is absolutely amazing! Nationally, 52 hours per year is the average number of hours

that a volunteer offers. If you take our purported one million minutes and turn that into hours, it is 16,667 hours. The national average for the same number of people is about 14,300 hours. This means that our Sesquicentennial Service volunteers gave on average 15% more in time than the national average.

But most importantly, what were people doing as they volunteered their time and energy? Here are but a few examples from an exhaustive list: served on a church committee or leadership board; taught Sunday School; ushered; sang in a choir; served in Stephen Ministry; served on boards of non-profit agencies; counseled college students; tutored; read books to children; packaged food or meals; helped to serve meals; picked up trash along the roadway; visited senior citizens; drove people to appointments; coached a children's or youth sports team; wrote letters to those in prison; mentored in the Coming Home program; collected and sorted clothing for those in need; mentored in some community program; served as a docent; engaged in the prayer ministry; served as a Friendly Visitor; helped to “produce” our virtual worship services; and the list goes on and on...

Thank you to all of you who reported your minutes so that we could have a sense of the level of giving of your time, even during this pandemic plagued year. Thanks to all of you who volunteered and didn't record your minutes, because the gift of your service is what matters most! Jesus said, “It is more blessed to give than to receive.” And again, in Luke 6:38, “Give, and it will be given to you. Good measure, pressed down, shaken together, running over, will be put into your lap. For with the measure you use it will be measured back to you.” As we move into 2021 may we continue to give of our time, talents, and treasures, as we live into this year's stewardship theme: “Blessed to be a blessing.”

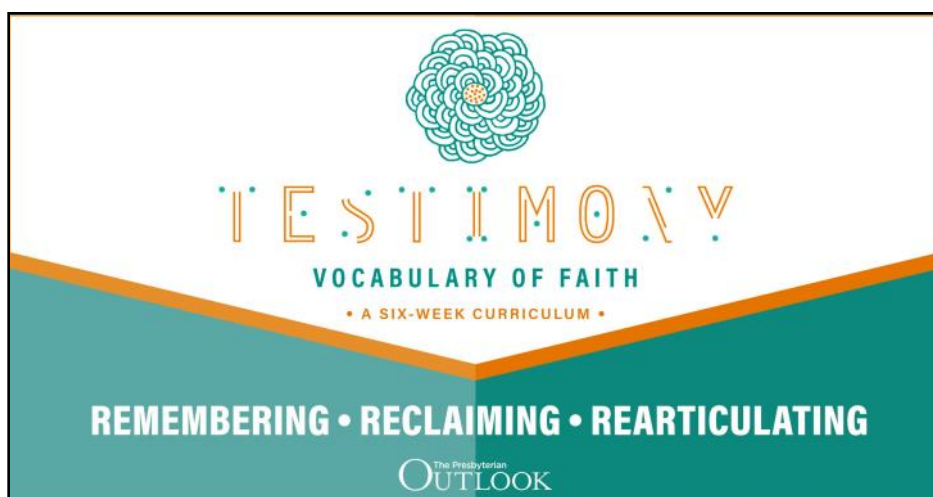

We look forward to offering the Coming Home program again early in 2022. If you have any questions, please contact John Miller (jmiller@ryepc.com).

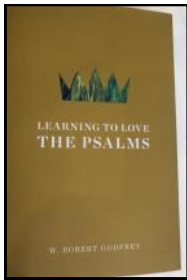

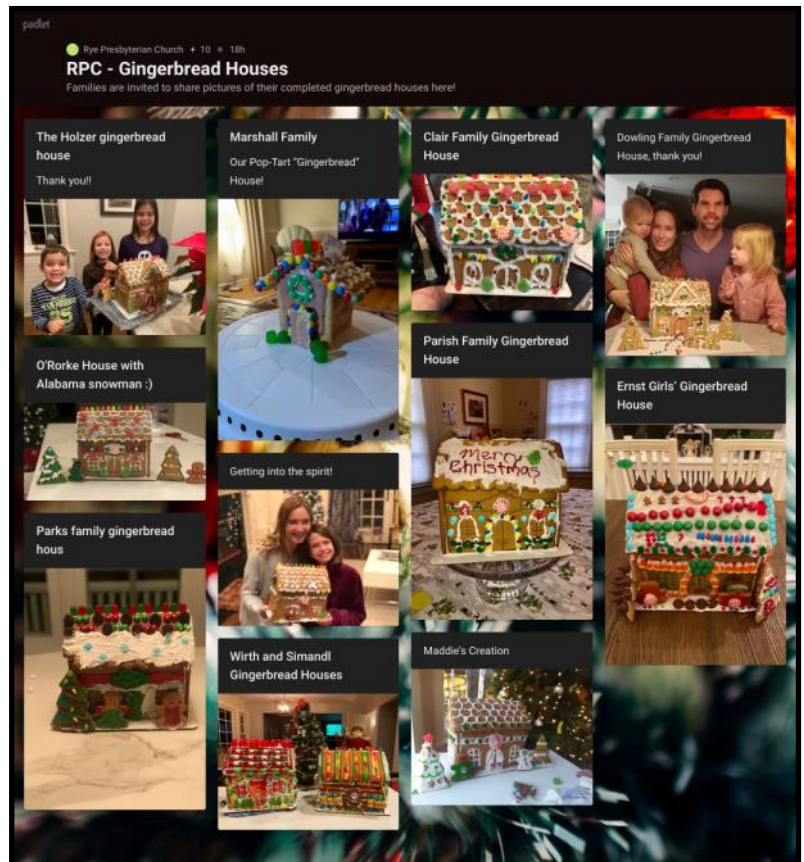

Update on Reading the Bible

On June 1, I began my pandemic-days discipline of reading the Bible (*The New Oxford Annotated* version of the NRSV) in published order (beginning with Genesis, ending with Revelation; not including the books of the Apocrypha). I set a timer for 30 minutes and read at a pace wherein I do not feel rushed, nor compelled to complete x-number of chapters or pages.

I completed Malachi – the concluding book of the Old Testament (the Hebrew Bible) – on December 14 and now am in Matthew (I'm writing this on December 16). A few thoughts about the Prophets, whose books comprise the final portion of the Old Testament: 1. Repetition is the driver – it seems that God wanted to make certain his warnings were heard about the sublimation of Israel and Judah by Assyria and Babylon and then the restoration to follow the seventy years in exile in Babylon; 2. The renewed importance of the rebuilt Temple in Jerusalem as the center of national identity through worship and communal customs and laws; and 3. The longer-range view of a messiah – one who would unify not only the tribes of Israel, but also the greater nations of the middle east (and, by poetic extension, the larger globe).
