As I have confessed before in this space, I have a bit of a problem when it comes to the gardens at our house. It starts in January with the arrival in the mail of a stack of seed catalogs filled with glossy photos of all kinds of plants - vegetables, flowers, perennials, fruit trees! There are reliable favorites that have been around for years, and every year, brand-new varieties that promise better color and better fruit- something new to try!

In March, the box comes, or rather, they start coming. When May arrives and it is time to plant, as I spread the seed packets out on the kitchen table, I realize I've done it again. Way too many seeds. Even with a Covid expansion of the garden beds. Way too many. And now the hard choice is before me. Do I plant with the spacing actually recommended on the packages? But I believe we all face very real choices now as life opens up and the world picks up speed once again. Many things put on hold will begin calling for our time and energy. Good things! Fruitful things! New things! Our own desire to reconnect with one another will need ways to come to reality. Quickly we will face again the pre-pandemic dilemma - living hectic lives in which we are spread too thin – our gardens overgrown – lush, but, in the end limited in the fruit they will bear.

During these last 15 months, hopefully we learned a few things. Whether by their absence or by having time to explore new avenues of growth, hopefully we learned lessons about what really matters, what nourishes us best, and what gives us joy and meaning. Perhaps we found a few new things to fill the time that are now best left behind.

How will our gardens grow? How will we prioritize the things that give us life and "make us complete," as John said in his sermon recently. What things will make <u>God's</u> joy complete?

There are lots of seeds in the catalog calling out to us. Will we give space and time and attention to the ones that will bear the fruit of the spirit? Love. Joy. Peace. Patience. Kindness. Generosity. Faithfulness. Gentleness. Self control.

How will our garden grow? It's time to decide. Growing in faith together,

Updated Worship Guidelines



Guidelines for In-Person Worship at Rye Presbyterian Church Updated May 2021

I was glad when they said to me, "Let us go to the house of the Lord!"

In June of 2020, a reopening task force was established by the Session to deliberate carefully regarding the most prudent course going forward for our church. It has continued to study recommendations and guidelines from the NYS Department of Health, the CDC, and Presbytery. The guiding principle of the task force has been to ensure the health and safety of our congregants and of our leadership.

In light of recent decisions by the CDC and New York State reflecting the improving situation regarding COVID-19, the Session has adopted revised guidelines regarding in-person worship and other gatherings at the church facility. Below are the new worship guidelines. We realize that some people may not yet be fully comfortable with changing safety precautions. Know that our live-stream services are going well and will continue in some form for the foreseeable future.

The following are procedures for in-person worship in the RPC sanctuary:

Worship attendance remains limited to allow for safe distancing for all present. For our sanctuary, that is about 150 people, depending on household size.

Those fully vaccinated may remove their masks if comfortable doing so, while those not yet vaccinated will be asked to wear masks and refrain from singing.

Pews will remain marked off to maintain social distancing. Please only sit in pews with the cushions turned down.

For the time being, we will not be requiring reservations to attend in person. This will be revisited for the fall season.

We request that you attend only if you are healthy, and are showing no signs or symptoms of illness. In addition, if you have not been fully vaccinated, please attend only if you have not had any known exposure to COVID-19 in the preceding two weeks.

Entry into the church will continue to be through the main sanctuary doors facing the Post Road.

Through the summer there is no Sunday School, but children are welcome to sit with their families during worship. Unvaccinated children over two years of age are required to wear masks. We will provide coloring pages and illustrated children's bulletins that will be connected to each Sunday's readings.

As has been our practice over the last year, the following remains true:

Families of five or less will be able to sit together. If your family group is larger, we ask that you split up and use two separate pews.

To increase air circulation, while the AC will be running, we will also have windows open. Please feel free to dress comfortably.

The offering plate will not be passed. Offerings may be put in the offering plates at the exits.

Coffee and refreshments will be available after worship in front of the sanctuary.

Thank you for taking the time to read this. It is good to be celebrating real progress together!

The Wired World Plugged into RPC

We all get our news from many sources—newspapers, magazines, Facebook and other internet providers, blogs, friends, and more. On April 8 RPC's Adult Ed program added 'The Wired Word"—providing news articles, discussion, and a connection with the Bible, all in 90 minutes, on Thursday evenings, led by John Miller. This program has proven to be a dynamic engaging resource to probe deeply into interesting current news stories, how they connect to the lives and values of the participants in the program, and selected Scriptural passages relate to them.

The group which picks the articles and some key questions about them, plus a few Biblical references for context does a remarkable job of choosing a wide range of subjects, while staying with current news. Some examples:

- The first article, from back on April 8, covered the freighter that got stuck in the Suez Canal for weeksvielding both rich opportunities for humor and an understanding of the complexity of international trade, its impact on the world and the perils that can come from some of the possible chokepoints in trade routes.
- On May 20, the article related to a premature baby born at 29 weeks on a Trans-Pacific flight which also "happened" to have on board as passengers three neo-natal intensive

- care nurses and a family medicine doctor. Was that chance, good luck, fate? Or was it perhaps Providence— God's hand providing positive help when needed? And would it also be God's hand at work when no nurses were on board and the child died? The answers often arose from one's views of faith.
- A week later, we leaped to the Israel/Gaza conflict. Though this was is "only" 100 years old, efforts at solving it have never succeeded. While a new cease fire was delicately holding we explored all the reasons why it might not, including the idea that it involves the land viewed as the ancestral homeland of both sides, the status of generations of refugees, and perhaps most important, the confluence of the Holy places of all three religions which sprung from Abraham—Judaism, Islam, and Christianity. We considered what a wonder it would be if, in the fact of those powerful passions, a lasting peace can be created in this volatile part of the world.

Fittingly, perhaps, the Wired Word program ended on May 27, with the conclusion of the Spring "semester" of Adult Ed. We will soon begin planning for the Fall. If you have ideas about programs the Adult Ed Committee should consider, contact Gary Gibson, Bob or Nancy Steed, or John Miller, the co-pastor who oversees Adult Ed.

CUPBEARERS at Church & Justice Service

On April 25 RPC held it's 26th Church and Justice Service, after having missed a year in 2020 because of Covid-19 restrictions. To ensure social distancing in the sanctuary, only five formerly incarcerated individuals led the service—Kevin Bartley, David Coleman, Fermin Mateen Flores, Anthony Dixon, and Eric Waters, our guest preacher for the day.

Eric's sermon, titled "The Moral Imperative of the Cupbearer," focused on the role and responsibility of each of us, as Cupbearers of the word of God, to be active and positive influences in the world. We have a moral imperative to reach out to those in need, seek peace and unity in the world, do justice, walk humbly, and fight all forms of bias and prejudice. That is, of course, the life that Jesus taught us to lead; and it is pre-figured as far back as Genesis in the description of the role of the Cupbearer to the king.

In addition to members of RPC, there were several guests in the sanctuary—other formerly incarcerated people and individuals involved in other ways in prison ministry.

All were uplifted and challenged by Eric's sermon and the responsibilities it outlined.

A Concert Using the New Organ in the Chapel

Please plan to attend a post-worship concert: Sunday, June 13 (beginning at approximately 11:00 a.m.), in the chapel. The 30-minute program will include works that demonstrate the new organ's individual stops and its overall ensemble. In addition, Ryan Capozzo (one of the Chancel Choir's section leaders) will sing a piece or two, this to demonstrate a bit of how the new organ can accompany solo singing; and we all will sing a hymn, this to experience the better support for congregational singing through placement of the new organ.

Seating will be limited to 30-40 persons due to continued distancing requirements. There is no need to register to attend.

A formal dedication of the new organ will take place in the fall, when we plan to return a normal schedule of worship services.

Choirs! And Looking Out for One Another

Given the CDC's guidelines (the science) that fully-vaccinated persons may sing in groups, inside, unmasked, and not distanced, we are planning to resume the ministries of our choirs come the fall. Where does the science meet our levels of comfort and how do we provide for the safety of our singers, mindful that some may not be able to be vaccinated or that some may have other medical conditions who, even though they are vaccinated, need to be maintain more caution in their interactions with others? In other words, how might we look out for one another?

The answers are many and might be temporary or permanent. 1. All non-vaccinated and non-fully-vaccinated persons will need to wear a mask until it is deemed safe not to do so (due to achieving "herd immunity" or some other scientific metric[s]). All fully-vaccinated persons may continue to wear a mask if they so choose. The honor system will apply to all aspects of mask-wearing practices. 2. We will honor as best we can recommended distancing between singers. 3. Rehearsals will be held in spaces where there is good air circulation/ventilation. 4. If singers are ill, they should stay at home in order to avoid transmitting the illness to others (again, the honor system will apply). 5. Hand sanitizer stations will be available at building entrances/exits. 6. Attendance will be taken at all times the choirs gather (this to have a record should there be need for contact tracing).

Shredding personal documents serves a double purposeto recycle paper as well as protect sensitive information against identity theft -- the fastest growing crime in the nation.

Remove all metal clips, fasteners, binders, folders and hard covers – like those on ledger books and marble composition notebooks, and place the papers/pages loosely in a box. (The covers should be discarded in regular household trash).

Up to four file-sized (10"x12"x15") boxes per household are allowed for shredding.

Please wait on line in the parking lot and stay in your car at all times, the Staff will remove the boxes from the trunk of your car. For the safety of everyone, you must wear a mask when speaking with anyone outside of your vehicle.

Why We Partner with Open Door

Health inequities in our communities have never been more evident than this past year. Throughout the COVID-19 health crisis, we have witnessed the disproportionate impact of the pandemic on those most vulnerable in our communities.

Open Door has been at the forefront of COVID-19 testing and treatment, and as a Federally Qualified Health Center, they are making sure vaccinations are accessible to those most in need.

At the height of the pandemic, Open Door quickly transitioned to providing telehealth and virtual visits and altered their programs to make sure that their patients still were provided with comprehensive health and wellness care. Health Centers were reconfigured to maintain safety. Fresh Food Markets pivoted into an Emergency Food Delivery program enabling 4,000 bags of fresh food to be delivered to those isolated at home. Santa Day became a toy distribution ensuring that every child would have a special gift during the holiday season.

Despite the challenges presented by the pandemic, Open Door remained committed to addressing the needs of prenatal patients, by modifying its signature Baby Box prenatal program. Now called the Open Door "Baby Bundle" Program, patients continue to have access to essential newborn and educational resources while social distancing and keeping everyone safe.


