As our shelter in place continues, which we are doing for the greater good of our communities, our neighbors, it seems like many people are becoming wearied by the "new normal" of working from home, schooling from home, and having *everyone* home. After more than a month of isolation, more and more people are talking about "opening the country" back up again, or getting back to "normal," especially in time for the summer. Yet U.S. health advisor Dr. Anthony Fauci has suggested that the world may never get back to what it considered "normal" before the coronavirus.

As people of The Book, we can turn to the scriptures, both the Old and New Testaments, to see how God's people have had to deal with the loss of "normal." In the Old Testament, you have the stories of the Exodus and the Exiles. While God's people were in exile, whether it be in Egypt or Babylon, they dreamt of what it would be like to return to their "promised land" and some sense of normalcy. They knew what it had been like because the generations before them passed down the stories of that land flowing with milk and honey. When they came up out of Egypt, when they returned from Babylon, the land was anything but the "normal" they had dreamt about.

In the New Testament we have the narrative of Jesus' resurrection. After Jesus was crucified we have stories of the disciples trying to return to what was their "normal" life BC, before Christ. What we see in the post resurrection appearances of Jesus to his followers is that he won't let them do that – to return to life as normal. Instead he calls them to something radically new and different, and sends them out to make a difference in the world.

While we have all worked hard to stay connected as a community of faith during these days of separation and isolation, we yearn for some sense of normalcy as a church as well. I hope and pray that God will use our faith community in some radically new and different ways as we begin to come back together in the months ahead.

On March 22 I stood in our chancel, joined only by Dan, JP, and Jason, and preached my first sermon looking into a camera that was flanked by empty pews. It certainly didn't feel normal. I will never again take for granted the joy of preaching face-to-

face. I ended that sermon with a poem by religious author Laura Kelly Fanucci. (It appears below.) But I want to close with the final words, because, in some way they capture for me what I hope and pray our "new normal" may look and feel like. She writes: "When this ends, may we find that we have become more like the people we wanted to be, we were called to be, we hoped to be, and may we stay that way — better for each other because of the worst."

We are social, spiritual beings who desperately need connection and a sense of purpose and this pandemic is challenging those essential elements of humanity. These are undoubtedly trying times. When I reflect on my experience of having been involved in the Coming Home program at RPC over the past few years, it is the sense of connectedness that Coming Home has brought into my life that I cherish the most.


Coming Home started in 2016 and was a natural extension of RPC's long-standing prison ministry programs. As a life-skills empowerment program, Coming Home provides a nurturing, supportive environment to help formerly incarcerated individuals re-acclimate to life on the outside and literally

"welcome" them home from prison. As a community we celebrate victories both big and small and get to witness remarkable moments of vulnerability and resiliency. Together we have witnessed the transformative power that a shared, collective experience can have on a group of people coming together for meals over an 18-week period. Somewhere along the way we become acutely aware that we are more alike than we are different and that we all need anchors and a supportive network to navigate our lives. Perhaps one the most unexpected gifts of Coming Home has been that the people giving of their time to contribute to the program's success have found themselves on the receiving end of the program's many blessings time and again.

Coming Home has brought me closer to my fellows, expanded my sense of community, and has filled me with a renewed sense of purpose. It has helped remind me that I am part of something much bigger. In many ways Coming Home has brought me closer to God and has somehow brought me closer to the man He wants me to be.

This brief work is presented as a three-act play and reads somewhat like *The Pilgrim's Progress*, the Christian allegory written by John Bunyan.

How should a Christian relate to the culture? For generations, Christians have been

told to either escape the culture to avoid its ungodliness, or to aggressively engage the culture by seeking power and control over it. But are those a Christian's only options? The Voting Booth presents a third path for a new generation of Christians seeking to love both God and their neighbor.

We meet the main character, Christian, on Election Day as he considers his vote. His struggle is an internal one more so than with the candidates themselves. He understands their respective visions for the country, but he doesn't know what future he wants and how he should live and vote in a post-Christian culture


-Wednesday Instagram Devotionals:

Music Notes

With the Hope of a Return to Some Form of Normal...

We have cancelled or postponed the special music events that had been scheduled to occur in May.

- 1. The Chamber Music concert slated for Sunday, May 3, has been cancelled. Details about the 2020-2021 season of Chamber Music at Rye Presbyterian Church will be announced in the summer or early autumn.
- 2. Jazz Weekend, which had been scheduled for May 16 and 17, has been cancelled. We plan to schedule one within the 2020-2021 program year (likely late winter or late spring).
- 3. My organ recital, which had been scheduled for the afternoon of Sunday, May 31, is cancelled. The reason is two-fold: a. the continuing unknowns relative to the effects of COVID-19; b. the graduation ceremony for Rye High School seniors still is slated to take place that afternoon. My plan is to find a date in the early fall (late September?) that will work well.

Looking ahead: Richard Gress, our Knock Intern in Sacred Music, plans to offer a 45-minute organ recital following 10:00 a.m. worship on June 7. Details to come.

Multiple high-quality videos of the grand organ at St. Sulpice in Paris, offered by 16-8-4 Productions. 16, 8, and 4 are three of the pitch levels of organ/music tone – 8 equals eight feet (the approximate length of an open pipe two octaves below "middle



C" that serves as the first pipe in a rank – the tallest ones you see next to/in front of the chancel window at RPC are approximately eight feet in length; 16 equals 16 feet, meaning three octaves below "middle C" as its first pipe; 4 equals 4 feet, meaning one


octave below "middle C" as its first pipe). The mechanics of the organ in St. Sulpice remain as they were when the current console and tonal work were completed by Aristide Cavaille-Coll in 1862; thus, you will see the console assistants doing the work of changing stops and operating the expression shades of the enclosed division, while the organist's only worry(!) is to play the notes.






















Easter at RPC via Zoom— Home Communion

Rye Presbyterian Nursery School

Greetings to the RPC Community from Kristin Bassett Kumar

Rye Presbyterian Nursery School is a well-established preschool for over 61 years in the heart of our community. Never in its history has it ever faced a school closure of this length. Since the state-wide school closures took effect, due to the COVID-19 outbreak, RPNS has implemented an extensive distance learning plan for preschool children. It took the creative minds of the RPNS teachers and administrators to put together an online learning platform that would be developmentally appropriate for preschool aged children. RPNS always aims to offer learning experiences that are memorable, child-centered, and create a sense of strong community. Keeping the community connected was essential during the COVID-19 crisis and happens to be a pillar in the Reggio-Inspired Philosophy that the school stands for. Many different curriculum experiences have been executed daily, but two experiences truly stand out.

One afternoon in late March, the Rye Presbyterian Nursery School and Rye Playschool faculty parked their decorated cars in the Nursery School parking lot. Families were invited to drive through the parking lot to see their teachers in parked cars. As the cars drove by, the teachers waved, and cars stopped at a safe distance to engage in conversation between teacher and student. It was a school-wide effort that left many in tears filled with appreciation. It truly was the community that made this happen. Rye City Manager, Greg Usry, supported this effort and RPNS is forever grateful to him for putting the wheels in motion for such an emotional experience.

Another experience RPNS provided for its school community was a friendship mobile area along the fence of the playground. The nursery school students were asked to create mobiles out of wire and recycled materials. The students were very comfortable working with these loose parts since they are typically exposed to them during school days. The friendship mobiles were dropped off and attached to the fence by the students daily. The mobile amounts grew and grew each day. The symbolism behind the mobiles was to acknowledge that even though the students are apart, they can continue to be together by placing their mobile on the fence next to a nursery school friend.

RPNS will continue to travel down this unexpected road with so many others in our country. Anything they can do to keep their school community connected in their mission.
