As we begin the month of March, we are well into the Lenten season, which began on February 17 with Ash Wednesday. Little did we know a year ago at this time what was in store for us. Who would have ever thought that we'd still be practicing our pandemic protocols a year later. And what a year it has been. We've had to ask ourselves many soul-searching questions. We've had to rethink what is really important in our lives. And we've also had to give up many of the cherished routines of our lives. In many ways, it has felt like a year-long Lenten experience. But we need to remember, Lent ends with the joy of Easter Sunday.

As more of us are vaccinated and as this deadly virus begins to subside, this year-long Lent will end, hopefully with something akin to the celebration of Easter at the end of it. We will appreciate life more because of what we have been through and because of whom we have lost. As we move through Lent, I invite you once again into a season of spiritual contemplation. Will Lent feel different this year because of all that we learned and experienced over the past year?


Earlier in my ministry, I had the opportunity to come to know personally Henri Nouwen, whose books I was introduced to while in seminary. Nouwen (1932–1996) was a Dutch Roman Catholic priest, writer, lecturer, and spiritual director. He taught for a time at Yale Divinity School, and introduced many Protestant clergy to previously unfamiliar spiritual disciplines from his tradition. Later in his life he was a leader at the L'Arche Daybreak Community for people with mental and physical disabilities. The first book of his that I read was *The Wounded Healer*. It is a book that is still worth revisiting. It is one of my required reading texts for the Introduction to Counseling class that I have taught at Sing Sing Correctional Facility for Rising Hope.

Here is something else by Father Nouwen which speaks to me this season, a prayer for these days of Lent:

How often have I lived through these weeks without paying much attention to penance, fasting, and prayer? How often have I missed the spiritual fruits of the season without even being aware of it? But how can I ever really celebrate Easter without observing Lent? How can I rejoice fully in your Resurrection when I have avoided participating in your death? Yes, Lord, I have to diewith you, through you, and in you—and thus become ready to recognize you when you appear to me in your Resurrection. There is so much in me that needs to diefalse attachments, greed and anger, impatience and stinginess.... I see clearly now how little I have died with you, really gone your way and been faithful to it. O Lord, make this Lenten season different from the other ones. Let me find you again. Amen.

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Adult Education



21 DAY RACIAL EQUITY CHALLENGE

Over the past several years the Adult Education Committee has offered a variety of studies and discussion groups which have focused on the issues of race and religion. One study included using Debby Irving's book, *Waking Up White and Finding Myself in the Story of Race*. In the summer of 2020, in response to the racial and social unrest taking place across the country, our Mission and Outreach Committee, with Session approval, responded by presenting "Panels for Peace." Prior to the pandemic, we were poised to engage in conversations about race with our Black brothers and sisters in Port Chester. It is our hope to do so in the future when we can meet again in person face-to-face.

As a next step to understanding racism in our lives and personal relationships, we invite you to join us for the 21 Day Racial Equity Challenge.

Creating effective social habits, particularly those dealing with issues of power, is like any lifestyle change – we have to work at it. Setting intentions and adjusting what we spend our time doing is essential. It's about building new habits. Sometimes the hardest part is just getting started. The good news is there's an abundance of resources to share and the family of faith to accompany one another. Debby Irving, author of "Waking Up White," and Dr. Eddie Moore, Jr. have formulated a 21-Day Action Plan designed to introduce people to new ideas and perspectives. For 21 days, from March 7-27, you are invited to choose one action per day in order to develop and/or deepen a racial equity practice built on education and engagement. In engaging, you will be exposed to voices and perspectives different than your own through articles, videos, and podcasts. Each day you will choose one way of engagement.

There are two ways to participate in this challenge: You may do it independently as an individual or family, and/or you may sign up for the small groups that will meet via Zoom throughout the challenge on the three Thursday nights during the challenge – March 11, 18 and 25 at 7:30 p.m.

Note that these small groups are being offered with the following intentions:

- To cultivate a space for participants to be fully present to each other, themselves and God;
- To foster an awareness that allows these voices and experiences to stir within our hearts and spirits;
- To invite each person to engage wherever they are in the present moment as they reflect on experiences and learnings through sharing and listening; and
- To reflect and share, not discuss, debate or problem-solve.





One Great Hour of Sharing, Stephen Ministry, Thrift Shop



One Great Hour of Sharing - Winter 2021

Around the world, millions of people lack access to sustainable food sources, clean water, sanitation, education, and opportunity. The three programs supported by One Great Hour of Sharing, the Presbyterian Disaster Assistance, the Presbyterian Hunger Program, and the Self-Development of People committee, all work in different ways to serve individuals and communities in need. From initial disaster response to on-

going community development, their work fits together to provide people with safety, sustenance, and hope. The One Great Hour of Sharing Offering provides us a way to share God's love with our neighbors in need.

Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) is the emergency and refugee program of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). It enables our congregations and mission partners to witness to the healing love of Christ through caring for communities adversely affected by crisis and catastrophic events. Prior to COVID-19, PDA deployed National Response Team members who would travel into presbyteries following a disaster. Now, members are virtually deployed to support presbyteries as they prepare for or respond to a disaster. Internationally, PDA is working with ACT Alliance, Presbyterian and community-led partners to respond to

natural disasters and working with Presbyterian World Mission and the Presbyterian Hunger Program to extend COVID grants to partners outside PDA's existing network.

The Presbyterian Hunger Program (PHP) works to alleviate hunger and eliminate its root causes. In 2019, PHP gave 94 grants totaling over \$1 million, impacting 20 countries, including the United States. This included \$161,000 that specifically went to alleviate famine in South Sudan, Somalia, Yemen, and Northern Nigeria. PHP partnered with 17 presbytery Hunger Action Advocates, 175 Hunger Action Congregations, and 234 Earth Care Congregations across the country.

The Presbyterian Committee on the Self-Development of People works with low-income communities to overcome oppression and injustice. In 2020, National SDOP entered partnerships with projects focused on advocacy, youth-led initiatives, skills development, farming, worker rights, immigration/refugee issues, and capacity building. Through One Great Hour of Sharing, projects in economically poor communities around the world have had an opportunity to develop solutions to their own challenges.

One Great Hour of Sharing is the largest way Presbyterians come together to do mission and ministry with those whom we see are in need. Through these gifts, we declare that the Church belongs with people whom we see suffering from the terrors of howling winds and natural disasters, those from whom we see COVID-19 took futures and livelihoods, and the whole cultures threatened as a result. Supporting the One Great hour of Sharing supports hunger, thirst, disaster recovery, refugee assistance, education, and community development for people in the United States and around the World. Please give generously. This offering will be received through Easter Sunday, April 4.

Session 1: March 6 - Virtual Tour of Machaneh Yehudah: Since physical travel to Israel is limited these days, we will go on a virtual tasting tour to see the sights, smell the smells, hear the sounds, and meet some of the people in Jerusalem's Shuk Machaneh Yehudah, one of the world's most popular markets and one of the world's most popular markets and a Mecca for foodies.

Session 2 - March 20 Jerusalem - Mike Hollander's Yet to be Patented 5-to-1 Model of the Holy City. This session explores the complexity of Jerusalem and its sanctity to almost 4 billion Jews, Christians, and Muslims. Since one cannot begin to understand the millennia of this important city's history in one hour, this session presents a fool-proof model to learn about the fundamental importance of Jerusalem as we explore the four quarters of the Old City and create a pallet upon which all other history can be understood.

Session 3 - April 11 Water, water! This session will explore the parched Land of Israel, from the Biblical Period

though Start Up Nation, and explore the challenges of an area with few natural water resources. The Bible describes Israel as "...a land with streams and springs and fountains issuing from plain and hills" and not a land of great rivers like the Nile, Tigris and Euphrates.

This session will explore how for millennia, from our ancestors until the modern era, residents of Israel have had to ensure enough water to farm and live here. The challenges have been enormous but not insurmountable, as Israel has become a world -renowned leader in water technology.



Mike Hollander is CSR's go-to guide for our congregational trips to Israel. Mike Hollander was raised in Vancouver (attending the same Jewish day school and High School as Rabbi Gropper) and made Aliyah in 1988. From 2001–2004, he was a Jewish Agency educational emissary in Great Britain for the Federation of Zionist Youth. He was also a consultant to the

"Israel Experience" and helped British youth movements and organizations design new programs and construct their educational storyline for their short-term summer Israel programs. He completed his MA from the Cambridge Center for Jewish-Christian Relations in 2008.

Mike's diverse and extensive experiences and opportunities have influenced his ability to provide a rich Israel experience to a wide range of groups, including Federations, Birthright, Interfaith groups, political groups, congregational trips, families, adults and more. His areas of expertise include history, politics, Middle Eastern and interfaith studies. Mike is married to Michele and has 3 Israeli-born children. When not guiding, he enjoys running, reading, yoga, and music.

Update on Reading the Bible

On June 1, 2020, I began my pandemic-days discipline of reading the Bible (*The New Oxford Annotated* version of the NRSV) in published order (beginning with Genesis, ending with Revelation; not including the books of the Apocrypha). I set a timer for 30 minutes and read at a pace wherein I do not feel rushed, nor compelled to complete x-number of chapters or pages.

Since my last update, I have read a significant number of the books of the New Testa-

ment: The four Gospels, Acts, and the letters attributed to Paul to the churches in Rome, Corinth, Galatia, Ephesus, Philippi, Colossae, and Thessalonica (I write this update on February 18). A few reflections:

- 1. While the actions and questions of the disciples and the Jewish leaders are important (by keeping the plot moving and diving into the tenets of societal life God's community, forgiveness, and grace includes each person, regardless of x, y, or z). I am reminded how the seemingly-minor characters (all who were healed and, even, those repudiated) in the Gospels testify to a deep faith and to living the "spirit" of the Law.
- 2. The zeal and the fortitude of the apostles, per the accounts in Acts, in doing as Jesus commanded in the Great Commission

- (the closing verses of Matthew) was exciting to encounter in its entirety (our Sunday lectionary cycle readings leave out quite a bit of material). Again, we see the testimony of including one's community (even when in prison or adrift at or in the sea Paul's experiences) to demonstrate God's love.
- 3. Paul's letters to the churches they are a topic unto themselves! While there are many questions about authorship (mindful this would apply to most documents that survive from antiquity), I think the intents of each are clear: encouragement and instruction (and attendant reasons why).

A Hymn for These Days

As we now are one year into COVID-19 pandemic life, this hymn by Thomas Troeger, seems particularly fitting. J-P stated in his homily on Ash Wednesday that we are very aware of mortality all around us; therefore, what about life? Perhaps Dr. Troeger's words serve to paint a portrait of how so many are doing so much to bring about healing – acts of love and compassion that can inspire us. The words below find their genesis in Mark 2:1-12.

We have the strength to lift and bear a friend's immobile weight, the strength to watch and nurse and care through hours long and late, because we trust in ways unknown the springs of health are stirred, and thus the mind, the flesh and bone receive Christ's healing word.

It was this hope and trust that filled the four who walked the road and bore their friend whose limbs were stilled beneath some hidden load.

Each foot a stone, each leg a rod, for years he lay in bed, in terror of a judging god and paralyzed by dread.

The awkwardness of matching strides and one another's pace while holding up the bed's two sides to keep their friend in place, the crowded street, the roof of clay, the scribes who took offense—not all of these could turn away those stubborn loving friends.

Christ, give your church that single hope by which those faithful four could lower down their friend by rope while others blocked the door. Though we may lack the gift to heal, this task is surely ours; to bring to you the lost who feel their need of gracious powers.


Worship
