Have you ever purchased something and then asked the clerk, "What if I need to return it?" Often we're told that we simply need to return it in its original factory carton or packing. Yeah, right! Who can ever get what we bought back into the box the same way in which it originally came? What we buy seems to expand exponentially so that it will never fit back into the box.

In May we celebrate two significant days in the Christian liturgical year. On Thursday, May 13, is the Ascension of our Lord. It is the day that we remember Jesus, forty days after his resurrection, returning to his Father in heaven (see Luke 24:44-53). The disciples had spent forty days with their Risen Lord. It became their new normal. But now, with his ascension, everything is about to change again – nothing will be the same. All of us now have some sense of what this is like as we've lived into a "new normal" during this pandemic year. It is as if everything spilled out of the box and we cannot put it back in the way that it used to be.

The second important celebration that comes in May this year is Pentecost, which arrives fifty days after Easter. Often referred to as the birthday of the Church, the biblical text from Acts 2 recounts the story of how the Holy Spirit came upon the disciples as they were behind closed doors in an upper room. Once again, everything changed. The church was born. The Spirit was on the loose. Again, the disciples learned to live into a "new normal" as God's Spirit filled people.

Jesus himself, when being questioned about the behavior of his disciples versus the behavior of the Pharisees or John the Baptist's disciples, said, in part: "Neither is new wine put into old wineskins; otherwise, the skins burst, and the wine is spilled, and the skins are destroyed; but new wine is put into fresh wineskins, and so both are preserved." As the Kingdom of God comes into being, God uses new people and new ways to bring it about. That, in part, is what Pentecost is about – the Holy Spirit being unboxed, unleashed, to do a new thing!

One of the watchwords of our denomination is, "Ecclesia reformata, semper reformanda" which is commonly mistranslated as "reformed and always reforming." The Latin verb is passive, and it is much better translated as "always being reformed" or "always to be reformed." Theologian Harold Nebelsick put it well: "We are the recipients of the activity of the Holy Spirit which reforms the church in accordance with the Word of God." The church is God's church, a creation of God's Word and Spirit. As we say in our Brief Statement of Faith, "we belong to God."

As things in our world begin to open up as more people are vaccinated, we will once again be invited to live into a "new normal." We don't quite yet know what that is going to look like. In the spirit of both the Day of Ascension and the Day of Pentecost (Sunday, May 23) I invite us to embrace the idea that not everything is going to fit back into the box. Let us remember that we belong to God and are "always being reformed" – being called to live into a "new normal."

That being said, as things do begin to open up, let us pause to give thanks for the "normal" things of life. I draw your attention to a poem that I shared with you one year ago in the May 2020 issue of Grace Notes. It was written by religious author Laura Kelly Fanucci. (It appears below.) May the final words in some way capture what I hope and pray our "new normal" may look and feel like. She writes: "When this ends, may we find that we have become more like the people we wanted to be, we were called to be, we hoped to be, and may we stay that way – better for each other because of the worst."

Pentecost Offering—Spring 2021



Each year on Pentecost Sunday (May 23), we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit and the birthday of the church. The Holy Spirit remains with us still, connecting us with the church of the past, continuing to inspire the church of today, and pointing us to the church of the future. Each year, this celebration is marked by receiving the Pentecost Offering which nurtures the faith of our children, youth, and young adults.

The Pentecost Offering unites us in a church-wide effort to support young people

and inspire them to share their faith, ideas, and unique gifts with the church and the world. It helps our youth begin life with a strong start, a solid foundation of faith formed in the first third of life, from childhood through young adulthood.

A gift to the Pentecost Offering helps the church encourage, develop, and support its young people around the world and address the needs of at-risk children in our own community.


- 40% of the Pentecost offering will be used to make an impact in our neighborhood by supporting Open Door Medical Clinic's Baby Bundle program.
- 60% will be used to support children-at-risk, youth, and young adults through ministries of the Presbyterian Mission Agency.
 - ♦ 25% goes to Young Adult Volunteer experiences to train and equip volunteers to engage in mission at more than 20 sites in the U.S. and around the world.
 - ♦ 25% goes to Guiding Youth, which supports ministries with youth, ages 12–18, and those called to accompany them.
 - ♦ 10% supports Child Advocacy which works with the "Educate a Child, Transform the World" national initiative, which was affirmed at the 221st General Assembly in 2014.

Since the Pentecost Offering started in 1998, Presbyterians have raised more than \$15 million for ministries that benefit younger members of God's family. Psalm 71 testifies that a foundation of faith established during childhood helps ensure lifelong faith and service. The patterns and lessons established during these formative years continue to bear fruit throughout a person's life. By giving to the Pentecost Offering, you are helping our children, youth, and young adults grow up to proclaim with the Psalmist, "O God, from my youth you have taught me, and I still proclaim your wondrous deeds."

We will discuss understanding and communicating personal values, enhancing communication among family members regarding wishes, medical treatments and interventions, and the use of appropriate legal healthcare documents.





- Bring your confidential personal papers for shredding.
- Remove all large binder clips and covers.
- Paper clips and staples are ok.

Can't come Tuesday? A locked bin will be available in Assembly Room for drop-off of materials beginning Friday, June 18.

Shredding personal documents serves a double purpose-- to recycle paper as well as protect sensitive information against identity theft -- the fastest growing crime in the nation.

Remove all metal clips, fasteners, binders, folders and hard covers – like those on ledger books and marble composition notebooks, and place the papers/pages loosely in a box. (The covers should be discarded in regular household trash).

Up to four file-sized (10"x12"x15") boxes per household are allowed for shredding.

Please wait on line in the parking lot and stay in your car at all times, the Staff will remove the boxes from the trunk of your car. For the safety of everyone, you must wear a mask when speaking with anyone outside of your vehicle.

Why We Partner with Open Door

Health inequities in our communities have never been more evident than this past year. Throughout the COVID-19 health crisis, we have witnessed the disproportionate impact of the pandemic on those most vulnerable in our communities.

Open Door has been at the forefront of COVID-19 testing and treatment, and as a Federally Qualified Health Center, they are making sure vaccinations are accessible to those most in need.

At the height of the pandemic, Open Door quickly transitioned to providing telehealth and virtual visits and altered their programs to make sure that their patients still were provided with comprehensive health and wellness care. Health Centers were reconfigured to maintain safety. Fresh Food Markets pivoted into an Emergency Food Delivery program enabling 4,000 bags of fresh food to be delivered to those isolated at home. Santa Day became a toy distribution ensuring that every child would have a special gift during the holiday season.

Despite the challenges presented by the pandemic, Open Door remained committed to addressing the needs of prenatal patients, by modifying its signature Baby Box prenatal program. Now called the Open Door "Baby Bundle" Program, patients continue to have access to essential newborn and educational resources while social distancing and keeping everyone safe.


