The season of Lent is one of the few church seasons that the culture has not yet really figured out how to co-opt, as it has done with Christmas and Easter. And yet, you still hear people ask, folks who don't ever attend a worship service, "What are you giving up for Lent?" The other interesting thing that occurs is that while many Christians wear ashes on their foreheads on Ash Wednesday, few, if any, don sackcloth! And yet, the two are often mentioned in the same breath in Scripture.

Today, we tend to picture someone wearing sackcloth as someone wearing a burlap bag with holes for the head and arms. In biblical times, sackcloth was made from the coarse hair of a goat. Because it produced some degree of pain or discomfort, it was worn by one who was mourning or as a public sign of repentance, atonement, or submission. Because of this, sackcloth was sometimes worn by the Prophets as an outward sign of their call to repentance.

The purpose of wearing sackcloth was intended to express one's sincere desire to turn one's heart toward God and to follow God faithfully. It was a physical "act of contrition." Although we no longer wear sackcloth as part of our Lenten practice, we are still called to practice true contrition: recognizing the discomfort that our actions may cause, grieving for the damage we have caused, and expressing a sincere desire to follow God with our whole heart, soul, mind, and strength.

Some years ago, I shared these words with you, but they are worth sharing again. In fact, every year at Lent I read them again. We don't need to give something up. We don't need to walk around in sackcloth. Yet of all the church seasons, Lent is the most appropriate time to do some soul searching.

In his book, *Whistling in the Dark*, Presbyterian pastor and author Frederick Buechner invites us into a Lenten observance as we follow in the footsteps of our Lord. He writes:

"In many cultures there is an ancient custom of giving a tenth of each year's income to some holy use. For Christians, to observe the forty days of Lent is to do the same thing with roughly a tenth of each year's days. After being baptized by John in the River Jordan, Jesus went off alone into the wilderness where he spent forty days asking himself the question what it meant to be Jesus. During Lent, Christians are supposed to ask one way or another what it means to be themselves.

• If you had to bet everything you have on whether there is a God or whether there isn't, which side would get your money and why?

- When you look at your face in the mirror, what do you see in it that you most like and what do you see in it that you most deplore?
- If you had only one last message to leave to the handful of people who are most important to you, what would it be in twenty-five words or less?
- Of all the things you have done in your life, which is the one you would most like to undo? Which is the one that makes you happiest to remember?
- Is there any person in the world, or any cause, that, if circumstances called for it, you would be willing to die for?
- If this were the last day of your life, what would you do with it?

To hear yourself try to answer questions like these is to begin to hear something not only of who you are, but of both what you are becoming and what you are failing to become. It can be a pretty depressing business all in all, but if sackcloth and ashes are at the start of it, something like Easter may be at the end."





As I reflect on the RPC Thrift Shop motto, "Repurpose with a Purpose," I am struck by the number of years and the many ways that this RPC Women's Association organization has been providing service to the church and community. From its humble beginnings as an annual tag sale in 1973, to last year's distribution of over \$80,000 in grants to 19 local non-profit organizations, countless volunteers have shared in the blessings of personal fellowship and support, while dedicating their time and service to the mission of "giving back" to the world.

Throughout my years as the Director of RPNS from 1983 to 2014, my staff and I rejoiced at finding gently used, affordable children's books, puzzles, games, toys, baskets, and other treasures for our preschoolers and our classrooms. I remember the dedicated volunteers who would greet shoppers with a smile, help us to find any need and invite us back the next week. I have always been indebted to the Women's Association and Thrift Shop for their initial grant to start up the RPNS Scholarship Fund in my son's name at the time of his death in 1995, as well as their continued grant every year since then. When I think of the number of preschoolers and their families who have been able to attend RPNS over the years because of the efforts of Thrift Shop volunteers, I marvel at the beautiful synergy of giving: donating, reclaiming and recycling, providing affordable items for shoppers, enjoying friendship and fellowship among colleagues, and raising funds to benefit people in need through local non-profits.

Now that I am retired, I love being able to "give back" by working with the wonderful people who continue the Thrift Shop legacy. As I delight in the new friendships that I have made, I am grateful for renewing friendships with the many volunteers and shoppers who are parents of children who attended RPNS. I love hearing the stories of their children and seeing the children return as young adults. It was with great sadness that we all shared the news of the passing of our own Jessica Gay on February 9. Our leader, Suzanne Davies, wrote, "Jessica's contributions to the Thrift Shop were many. I am fairly sure she clocked in more volunteer years than any of us. Even through her illness, Jessica was polishing silver, and coming in when she could not have felt very well. Her spirit was always up, as she lived her days to their fullest. We were all honored that they included us! Oh, how we will miss our dear friend." We are so grateful to have the memory of spending Jessica's last day with us, quietly cleaning, pricing and organizing together as we shared stories about our children, grandchildren, family and Christmas holiday. Fellowship is truly one of the blessings of volunteering.

There are many opportunities for service at the Thrift Shop. You can donate housewares, jewelry (real and costume), knick-knacks, artwork, toys, lamps, china, silver, crystal, children's books, and small furniture. Volunteers are welcome on Wednesdays, from 9:00-1:00 when we price, clean, and organize donations, on Thursdays, from 10:00-1:00, when the Thrift Shop is open and on some Saturdays, when we hold our Saturday Sale. Literacy Curriculum



For the 2019-2020 school year, RPNS has incorporated the Wilson Language literacy program called Fundations into our daily literacy instruction. Our fours/ fives classrooms have been using this literacy curriculum since the beginning of the school year. The goal of the Fundations Pre-K program is for the students to learn the names of the letters and their corresponding sounds, as well as, teach the children the proper formation of uppercase and lowercase letters.

The literacy curriculum in our threes classrooms prepares the children for the fours literacy program by allowing the

students to participate in activities that promote phonemic awareness (hearing and understanding that words are made up of smaller sounds). Each week the children study two letters and learn the name of the



letter, the keyword that is associated with the letter, and how the letter is formed. The program is cumulative as previously learned letters are continuously reviewed. When learning vowels, the program focuses on short vowel sounds as they are found more often in words.

In our fours and fives, the teachers use a special writing grid to teach the children the proper way to form the letters. They model for the children how to form the letters in uppercase and lowercase consistently following a specific stoke



sequence and verbalize how the letter is formed on the grid. The lines on the grid have child friendly names that help the children (the sky line, the plane line, the grass line, and the worm line). The picture of the plane is always flying to the right to remind the students to write from left to right.



In addition, the Fundations literacy program uses "sky writing" during whole group instruction to help teach the children letter formation. Sky Writing is a way for students to use gross motor movement while learning the correct way to write a letter. After following the verbalizations to form the letter "in the sky" using their "arm pencil," the class repeats the letter name, keyword, and sound. This multi-sensory approach helps to form a tight association with the letter, its sounds, and how it is formed.

Small group work is an essential part of the program as the students have the opportunity each week to practice forming the letters. In our fours and fives the children use their own dry erase writing grids and letter formation sheets and in our threes the children explore letters in a fun and multi-sensory way (example: writing letters in sand or shaving cream).



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
