


As you will soon see in your Stewardship 2020 mailing, this coming year marks the 150th year of the beautiful sanctuary that is at the center of our life as a church.

Over the recent years, and especially through our recent Imagine Initiative, we have been excellent stewards of the structure created for our inspiration by those who came before us. We have sought to faithfully repair and restore that which 150 years of use require.

Decades of old paint were stripped off before fully repainting the sanctuary in 2014. And as the new clerestory windows are installed, all but two of the stained glass windows have been re-leaded and fully restored.


While the sanctuary may seem to be a constant in our lives, it has seen significant change over the years. In 1908, the organ was moved from the front corner to a newly constructed balcony. In the late 1940s, the original east wall was completely removed, and a new expanded chancel was



built along with the amazing stained glass window it contains.

While not on as grand a scale as those historic changes, your leadership has been considering the installation of a new stained glass window to replace the current one at the front of the sanctuary near the door to the chapel, as our way to mark and celebrate 150 years of the sanctuary's presence.

"Why replace? Why not restore?" are questions which have been asked. As our stained glass experts have said to us, "It is not your best window" - both in terms of subject matter and artistry. In addition, at present all our other aisle windows portray both men and women of faith, but this one, only men. And thus far, all our



other windows portray only people from the New Testament, with no one from the Hebrew Scriptures to be found.

To remedy these things, we are looking at plans for a new "Abraham and Sarah" window. All three monotheistic religions trace their roots to Abraham, and in these divisive days, acknowledging our common heritage seems both good and important.

As you can see from some of the proposal sketches, it is a work in progress. Like most bible stories (and human stories), it is more complicated than at first glance. As Abraham and Sarah struggled to trust God's promise of a child, Abraham has a child by Sarah's slave-girl Hagar. The child is Ishmael, and it is through him that the Muslim religion traces their lineage. Complicated, but a part of the story. Both Ishmael and his mother are included in our latest design proposal.

Perhaps most important is the added line at the bottom of the window: "I will bless you, and in you all families of the earth shall be blessed." It is the promise made by God to Abraham, and through him to each one of us who trace our spiritual lineage through him. As



the people of this church have experienced in the sanctuary and in life, God promises to bless us. God promises to keep us in times of difficulty, to strengthen us in adversity, and to lead us into the future, but always with the larger world in view. Abraham and his whole complicated family were greatly blessed, and through them, all the world continues to be blessed with a rich and dynamic heritage of faith.

So, too, with us. May we all be blessed – both in our sanctuary, as we enter the next chapter in the story of this church, and in all of life. As we leave that beautiful space blessed and inspired, may we all go out to be a blessing to the people and the world around us.



Prison Ministry, David Coleman Concert

Prisoners Making Exceptional Strides

On September 21, four members of RPC went to the gym at Fish-kill Correctional Facility, along with almost 100 inmates, volunteers from other organizations, and some Fishkill staff. We gathered to celebrate the 5th annual Recognizing Individual Exceptional Strides Award (R.I.E.S.A.) ceremony. The event was sponsored by Community Minded Organization (CMO), an inmatecreated and managed organization which works with many outside organizations, including RPC.

This was an exceptionally moving and powerful ceremony, as about 8-to-10 inmates were called up from the audience individually and introduced with a description of what they had done to earn their R.E.I.S.A. award. Each gave a brief response of gratitude and how they felt on their journey to growth and development. Awards were also given to staff members and volunteers who have served as counselors and teachers.

Your Grace Notes correspondent failed to take notes, so only a few awards will be listed below to give a sense of what was being celebrated:

- The inmate who finally conquered his substance abuse habit after several tries.
- Another who was recognized for the help he gave other inmates suffering with mental illness.
- A counselor was recognized for the tough love and constant support she gave to all with whom she worked.
- Another inmate was recognized for the strides he had made in increasing his education.

Fishkill is a medium security prison and there were no Correction Officers (guards) in the gym, although several were stationed in the hallway outside the door. We were free to move about the gym to visit with men we knew from our monthly meetings and to meet new people. During this time we were also served lunch. The picture is of the RPC volunteers and some of

the men we had known while they were earning their Masters degree from New York Theological Seminary at Sing Sing.

Part way through the event, we had to pause for "the count." While we sat at our tables, the inmates lined up single file along the walls and walked to the front of the room where the officers were, to show that they had their pass to be at the event and to be counted so the officers knew there were the same number of men there as had originally entered the gym. Then they walked around back to where they had been.



At the end of the event, the inmates presented a play, with music, that was written and directed by one of the prisoners who had been a TV actor, featured several times on Law and Order. The play was a cautionary tale of the risks awaiting men after they are released. "Fred" and "Joe" had been friends while incarcerated at Fishkill and they are now in the same neighborhood.

While they had been in Fishkill, Joe helped Fred in many ways and feels Fred "owes" him. Fred is trying very hard to stay straight and not get in trouble with the law again. Joe pushes Fred hard to do something "fishy" and to return the help Joe had been to him. Fred feels guilty about not repaying the debt he owes by doing a favor for Joe in return. This ethical conflict is played out with increasing tension. After the play, we were told by several inmates that this is a common dilemma facing men after they are released.

The theme of the event was "The Person who has the Worst Past may be the Creator of the Best Future." When the RPC volunteers left it seemed clear that the men who had been honored and the inmates who had created the event were making exceptional strides in making that theme a reality in their lives.

David Coleman Concert Sunday, November 17, 7:30 p.m., Assembly Room


RPC will present a concert featuring David Coleman, a multi-talented musician, singer/songwriter, and storyteller. Entitled 3 CHORDS AND THE TRUTH, this concert is a Journey of Hope and Redemption Through Music. The program includes songs, many of which Dave has written, interspersed with a spoken narrative describing the arc of his life.

Dave got his first guitar at age 15, a scant two years before he was incarcerated, beginning a long period of imprisonment in the New York State correctional system. He developed his musical talents during that period, while also becoming an accomplished painter and a certified horticulturist. But Dave was always most at peace when playing his music. He uses the healing power of music to describe his struggle to get through tumultuous times. As Dave says: "People cannot be defined by the worst thing they've ever done. People can and do change. You may start in a bad place, but you don't have to stay there."

John Miller and several members of RPC who visit in prison saw Dave present this program at the Duplex Theatre in lower Manhattan, a venue for new artists. We were all deeply impressed and immediately began to arrange to bring an expanded version of the program to RPC and make it available to the public in Rye and surrounding communities.

The cost is \$10 per person, payable by cash or check at the door.










A NOVEMBER FOOD COLLECTION FOR RPC NEIGHBORS IN NEED
