While our building usually becomes a bit quieter during the week during the summer, that will not be the case this year. Some of you know that for years our church was home to the Ward Summer Learning Camp, named for our own Juanita Ward. When I moved back here to the Northeast in the spring of 2008, it didn't take me long to learn that "church" is done differently here in the Northeast, versus my 23 years in Texas and my seven years of church work prior to that in California. Here, at least in many Presbyterian churches, Sunday School for children happens during worship. The upside is that it basically makes for a "one hour" Sunday morning experience for families. The downside is that it makes it harder to engage folks as Sunday School teachers and our children and youth don't get to have the full worship experience very often. The other significant difference that I noticed was that many folks here in the Northeast seem to not only go on vacations in the summer, but they also often take a "vacation" from church. I learned this in 2008 while serving the church in Scarsdale. In the spring we had great attendance and lots of excitement about there being a new pastor. By July and August, worship attendance was down by 40-50%! I wondered what I had done wrong. I hadn't done anything wrong, I just didn't know about this Northeast behavior regarding summer church attendance.

That being said, I would like to highlight for you some of the exciting ministries that will continue on throughout the summer. While our Saturday at 5 worship takes a break during the summer, both Sunday morning worship services continue on at their same times -8:30 a.m. and 10:00.a.m. Join us! And remember, the sanctuary, thanks to the Imagine Initiative, is now air-conditioned.

Most weeks Summer Sunday School is offered during the 10:00 a.m. service. So there is something for your children. While our fantastic choir takes a break for the summer, our volunteer summer choir still offers you five more opportunities to sing – July 7, 21, 28 and August 4 & 11. This summer our youth will travel to New Orleans not once, but twice – June 30-July 6 and August 4-10, as they continue to extend the ministry of our church to those whose lives were changed by Katrina. Please pray for both of these groups as they travel and work on our behalf. On August 25, we will once again commission Young Adult Volunteers (YAVs) on behalf of the Presbyterian Church (USA) as we have done for the past several years.

Camp needed to find a new home for just this summer. We are glad that we can welcome the Ward Summer Learning Camp back to our facilities this summer from July 8 – August 2. The camp will be using a significant number of rooms and outdoor spaces during this time, so if you are planning any meetings at the church during the weekdays during these dates, please check with Peggy in the church office for room availability. But, more importantly, if you are around, please extend a warm welcome to our school-aged neighbors from Port Chester.

I welcome the summer months because they bring with them fewer night meetings which allows me to spend more time with my family. I want to invite you, when you are in town during the summer, to come and join your church family for worship. As I've said to folks on more than one occasion, "We're here all summer long. Join us!"

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Adult Education, Stephen Ministry

Adult Education's Exciting Plans for Fall/Winter 2019

In June, having concluded a diverse, enriching group of programs during church year 2018/19, the Adult Education Committee wasted no time beginning to plan even more exciting offerings starting in the fall of 2019. Below is a preview of what we are considering to offer our church community for the church year 2019/20.



To start, Dan is proposing to lead a program every other Tuesday evening starting late September on "Everything You Forgot From Confirmation" (or

maybe never learned). *Each of the approx. 11 sessions will be a standalone, so continuous attendance isn't necessary.* You can drop in and out as your schedule permits, but we think it will be a

rich re-introduction to our faith for members of all ages.

The other major evening program will be led by John and will focus on the issue of race in America. This will be a fourweek discussion based on a book by Debby Irving titled "Waking Up White and Finding Myself in the Story of Race." Parts of the book, along with other resources, will help us examine subjects like racism,

our own feelings about the subject of race in today's America, and where this issue will lead us in the future in our changing society.

One of the reasons for this fall series is to help us develop the vocabulary and awareness to engage in a several-week bi-racial

discussion group, to be developed for the Spring "semester." We would work with an experienced facilitator and connect with a group of African Americans, drawn from nearby churches, about equal in number to members of RPC, who would be participating. We are hopeful that this sort of discussion can help us all experience how to communicate candidly and comfortably with anyone on a subject which is typically avoided by everyone.

On Sundays, we will continue our weekly 9:00 to 9:45 a.m.

program based each week on the Scripture to be used in that morning's worship. Re-titled "Coffee and Conversation," it will also be expanded three times during the year to focus in detail on the three main directions of RPC's Mission and Outreach work—prison



ministry, children, and underserved communities. Of course, we will continue to offer three Bible study opportunities, the "Three T's" discussion group, and the cancer support group.

We are considering two other ideas which may be developed during the year. One is to create a book with a working title of "RPC Prays." It would be composed of prayers submitted by members of the congregation and written by themselves or others. The prayers could be organized into themes and ultimately be made available to the congregation in book or loose-leaf format. Second, we are considering a program on divorce (or marital difficulties, more generally). The audience, content, leadership, and other details of this will need to be explored in more detail, but it is clearly an important and delicate subject.

We urge you all to "Stay Tuned" for more details and specifics when the Fall/Winter 2019 brochure on Adult Education is published in early September.

People often ask, "What exactly is a Stephen Minister?" One way to put it is that Stephen Ministers are the *After People*.

Stephen Ministers are there:

- ... after the phone call you hoped you'd never get.
- ... after the divorce papers are served and the bottom falls out of your life.
- ... after the funeral, when everyone has left and the emotions you've held at bay come crashing in on you.
- ... after the doctor says, "I'm sorry, but there's nothing more we can do."
- ... after the nursing home director shakes your hand and says, "Welcome to your new home."
- ... after the last child honks the horn, waves, and drives away—and the house suddenly seems empty.
- ... after the gavel goes down, the handcuffs go on, and your loved one is led away.
- ... after the baby arrives, demanding more of you than you ever dreamed possible.
- ... after the employer explains your job has been included in the recent downsize.
- ... after your family and friends have heard your story one too many times, but you still need to talk it out.

Stephen Ministers are the After People. They are ready to come alongside you, your friends, neighbors, coworkers, or relatives to provide comfort and support for as long *after* as needed. Christian Education



This summer our children will engage two curriculums: *The Lord's Prayer: An Illustrated Curriculum* and *An Illustrated Earth: Celebrating God's Creation.* All children Pre-K through 5th grade will engage these

curriculums together as a multi-age group in the Westminster Room during the 10:00 a.m. service.

Through *The Lord's Prayer*, children will engage a verse-by-verse study of the Lord's Prayer from Matthew 6:9b-13 with the hope that it helps the children embody the prayer's message in their daily lives. Through *An Illustrated Earth*, children will focus on celebrating and taking care of God's creation. We will do this by engaging biblical stories that celebrate water, plants, food, and animals. It is our hope that this curriculum plants within our children a deep love for one another and all of God's creation.
